Founded in 1874, SUNY Maritime College is an undergraduate and graduate institution focused on engineering, business, science, and maritime transportation. It is the oldest and largest of the nation's six state maritime colleges and is located at historic Fort Schuyler on the Throgs Neck peninsula in the Bronx. Maritime College graduates hold leadership positions in the maritime industry, business world, law, government and in space as a NASA astronaut. Its bachelor's degrees in marine transportation, marine engineering, naval architecture, facilities engineering and marine environmental science, and master's degree in international transportation management are unique in the state. Through its world-class curriculum, leadership development programs, hands-on training during 3 international summer sea terms aboard Training Ship Empire State VI, and professional experience gained during corporate internships, Maritime College graduates are well prepared to be leaders in New York's economy, particularly as it relates to the maritime industry, international trade, supply chain management and port and maritime security.

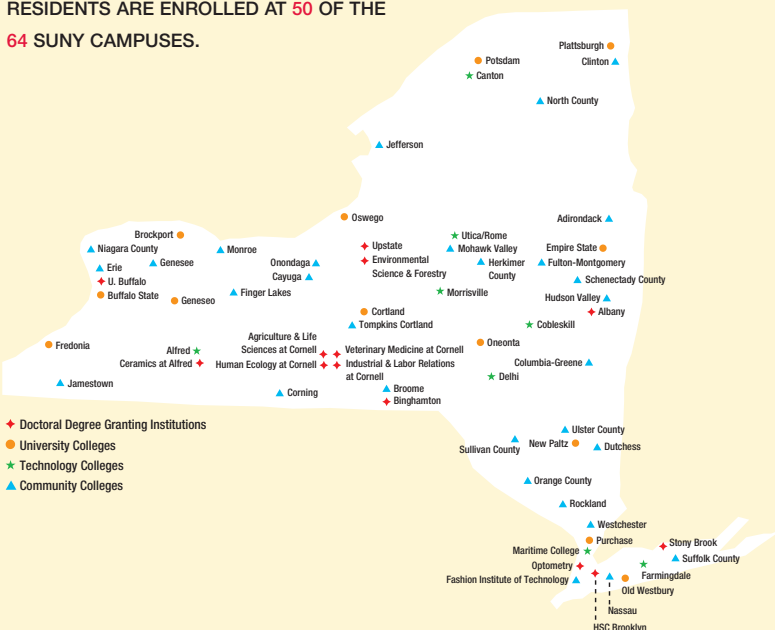

- For 2009, *U.S. News & World Report* ranked SUNY Maritime College a top tier baccalaureate college, 6th among public baccalaureate colleges in the North, and 86th in its "Best Undergraduate Engineering Programs in U.S.A." category.
- In 2009, *The Princeton Review* named the College a "best northeastern college" in America.
- Maritime College graduates experience 100% job placement in careers of their choice within three months of graduation and consistently earn among the top starting salaries in America. The average starting salary for the undergraduate Class of 2008 was \$61,000.
- Maritime College's Empire State VI, a 17,000 ton, 565-foot training ship is the best equipped training ship in the nation.
- Maritime commissioning opportunities and ROTC include the following: Navy ROTC, Merchant Marine / Navy Reserve, Air Force, Coast Guard and the Marine Corps.



SUNY's Impact on New York City

The four SUNY colleges located in the five boroughs provide key economic development resources for New York City. The colleges—SUNY Downstate Medical Center, Maritime College, College of Optometry and Fashion Institute of Technology—have combined expenditures of \$918 million per year, capital construction budgets of \$94 million and attract millions of dollars of research funds in the areas of biotechnology, engineering, port security, small business development, public safety, medicine, and other areas. They enroll over 16,714 students, employ more than 7,800 faculty and staff, and grant more than 4,500 degrees annually.

Other SUNY Campuses in New York City

- **SUNY Downstate Medical Center** is the only academic medical center in Brooklyn and one of only 127 in the United States. The campus is a vital part of the Brooklyn community; one of its largest employers; and a critical source for education, research, and health care. Downstate's College of Medicine, College of Health Related Professions, Program in Public Health, College of Nursing, and School of Graduate Studies enroll approximately 1600 students and offer a broad professional education that prepares students for practice or health related careers in any location or community.
- **College of Optometry** is the only institution of its kind in New York State and has an outpatient vision care facility which sees in excess of 130,000 patient visits per year at the college and satellite clinics. The University Optometric Center provides significant community service through its main clinic, nursing homes and more than 40 satellite facilities in the metropolitan area. A hallmark of the College of Optometry has been its basic and clinical research conducted by members of its faculty and associated professional staff. The University Optometric Center houses funded clinical research studies. The College's Center for Vision Care Policy conducts research in vision care delivery, eye care workforce studies and related areas. The College has an international reputation for new innovations and technology in eye care.
- The **Fashion Institute of Technology**, a college of art and design, business and technology, is a worldwide leader in creative career-oriented education. The largest SUNY institution in New York City, FIT's student body of 10,000 includes nearly 1,000 international students from more than 75 countries. The college provides students an unmatched combination of specialized curricula, industry interaction, and in-depth liberal arts education, offering 44 majors leading to the AAS, BFA, BS, MA, and MPS degrees in such diverse areas as Interior Design, Advertising and Marketing Communications, and Toy Design, as well as Fashion Design and Fashion Merchandising Management. Through its programs, internships, and career placement, the college plays a critical role in the growth and vitality of many core industries in the city's economic fabric.

- **SUNY's Neil D. Levin Graduate Institute** is a leading center for teaching, research, and outreach on impacts of globalization. Levin delivers innovative programs for graduate and professional students, and is a global platform for SUNY, helping open a Beijing office and implementing China 150, a scholarship program announced by Governor Paterson and endorsed by Chinese Premier Wen. Levin launched the Center for Competitive Response to Globalization to boost jobs in New York, with ExporTech (increasing exports) and JumpStart NYC, supported by NYC Economic Development Corporation to help displaced individuals transition to new jobs.
- The **Museum at FIT** is the only museum in New York City dedicated solely to the art of fashion. The museum is best known for its innovative and award-winning exhibitions, which are free and open to the public. The museum also houses a permanent collection of more than 50,000 garments and accessories dating from the 18th century to the present, as well as 300,000 textiles and 10,000 fashion photographs. The museum's mission is to advance knowledge of fashion through exhibitions, publications and public programs.

Programs and Facilities

- The **New York Strategic Center for Port Security** was established at Maritime College to improve vital homeland security operations in the areas of inspection, communication, scheduling and logistics, and remote detection of nuclear and radiological materials.
- **Advanced Biotechnology Incubator Park**. This SUNY Downstate Medical Center project is the cornerstone of a Brooklyn-wide effort to attract biotechnology research and development. The incubator is designed to meet the growing demand for affordable manufacturing space in New York. Phase I of the project is completed and actively leasing space; Phase II is under construction. Eventually the Incubator will form part of a two-block biotechnology "park" adjacent to Downstate's main campus.
