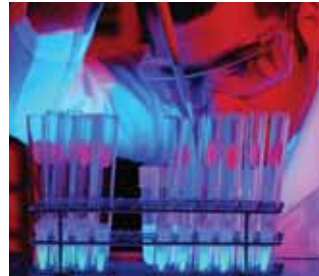

Genesee's main campus in Batavia is located within an hour's drive of Buffalo and Rochester, near Thruway exit 48. Its seven buildings connect to form a mall-like, all-indoor college campus.

Opened in January of 2006, the Wolcott J. Humphrey III Student Union provides 10,000 square feet of space for students' use. It houses a café, computer stations, pool, ping pong and air hockey tables, and conference rooms for student government and club meetings.

The campus hub is the William W. Stuart Forum, a three-story enclosed courtyard used as a meeting place, for presentations, and to stage events like Genesee's annual fashion show.

The College's Alfred C. O'Connell Library features mission-style furnishings for quiet study and computer workstations for access to an increasing number of Internet-based research resources.
