



NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES **Opportunities in the Division of Research Programs**

NEH FELLOWSHIPS

NEH Fellowships support individuals pursuing advanced research in the humanities that contributes to scholarly knowledge and to the general public's understanding of the humanities. Applicants may be faculty or staff members of colleges or universities, of primary or secondary schools, or independent scholars or writers. Recipients usually produce articles, monographs, books, digital materials, archaeological site reports, translations, editions, and other scholarly tools. Support is provided for projects that can be completed during the tenure of the award as well as for work that is part of a long-term endeavor. Awards are \$4,200 per month for six to twelve months. *Deadline: May 1st*

FACULTY RESEARCH AWARDS

Faculty Research Awards are open only to individual faculty members at Historically Black or Tribal Colleges and Universities or Institutions with High Hispanic Enrollment. Awards support research in the humanities by individual researchers working on projects that contribute to scholarly knowledge and to the general public's understanding of the humanities. Recipients usually produce articles, monographs, books, digital materials, archaeological site reports, translations, editions, and other scholarly tools. Support is provided for projects that can be completed during the tenure of the award as well as for work that is part of a long-term endeavor. Awards are \$4,200 per month for six to twelve months. *Deadline: May 1st*

SUMMER STIPENDS

Summer Stipends provide individuals with an opportunity to pursue research in the humanities that contributes to scholarly knowledge and to the public's understanding of the humanities. Recipients usually produce articles, monographs, books, digital materials, archaeological site reports, translations, editions, and other scholarly tools. Projects may be completed during the tenure of an award or they may represent part of a long-term endeavor. Faculty members teaching full-time at colleges and universities must be nominated by their institutions before applying and should check with their sponsored research offices for details. Other applicants, such as independent scholars and adjunct instructors, do not need institutional nomination. The award is \$6,000 for two consecutive months of full-time research and writing. *Deadline: October 1st*

TEACHING DEVELOPMENT FELLOWSHIPS

Teaching Development Fellowships support full-time college faculty pursuing research aimed specifically at improving their classroom teaching. To be eligible for support projects must improve existing undergraduate courses the applicant already teaches. Proposals must stress the connection between the proposed research and the applicant's current teaching portfolio. The research undertaken as a part of the grant may involve engaging with fundamental texts or sources, exploring related subjects or academic disciplines, acquiring new language or digital-humanities skills, or cultivating neglected areas of learning. Awards are \$4,200 per month for three to five months. *Deadline: October 1st*

FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMS AT INDEPENDENT RESEARCH INSTITUTIONS

Fellowship Programs at Independent Research Institutions support research centers that offer long-term (4 to 12 month) fellowship opportunities to scholars for advanced research in the humanities. Funding priority is given to centers that provide scholars with access to resources that may not be available at their home institutions. Only independent research institutions may apply for NEH funding. Awards are generally made for one to four year periods. FELLOWSHIPS AT DIGITAL HUMANITIES CENTERS

Fellowships at Digital Humanities Centers fund collaboration between digital centers and individual scholars. An award provides funding for both a stipend for the fellow while in residence at the center and a portion of the center's costs for hosting a fellow. The intellectual cooperation between the visiting scholar and the center may take many different forms and may involve humanities scholars of any level of digital expertise. Fellows may work exclusively on their own projects in consultation with center staff, collaborate on projects with other scholars affiliated with the center, function as "apprentices" on existing digital center projects, or any combination of these. Awards are made to the digital humanities center. The award can be up to \$8,400 a month for six to twelve months. *Deadline: September 15th*

COLLABORATIVE RESEARCH GRANTS

Collaborative Research Grants support original research undertaken by a team of two or more scholars or research coordinated by an individual scholar that, because of its scope or complexity, requires additional staff or resources beyond the individual's salary. Support is available for various combinations of scholars, consultants, and research assistants; project-related travel; field work; applications of information technology; and technical support and services. Grants support full-time or part-time activities for periods of one to three years and are generally for \$25,000 to \$100,000 per year. *Deadline: November 4th*

SCHOLARLY EDITIONS GRANTS

Scholarly Editions Grants support preparation of authoritative and annotated texts and documents that are currently inaccessible or available only in inadequate editions. Projects usually involve significant literary, philosophical, and historical material, editions of foreign language materials in the original language, musical notations, digitization and publication of completed print or microfilm editions in electronic form, and other types of work. Editions produced with NEH support contain scholarly and critical apparatus appropriate to the subject matter and format of the edition. Awards are made for one to three years and normally range from \$50,000 to \$100,000 year. *Deadline: November 4th*
