Educational Opportunity Program Applicants

Program Description

The State University of New York's Educational Opportunity Program provides access, academic support and financial aid to students who show promise for succeeding in college but who may not otherwise be offered admission. Available primarily to full-time, matriculated students, the program supports students throughout their college careers within the University.

Program Eligibility

To be eligible for admission to the Educational Opportunity Program a student must: 1.) be a New York State resident for 12 months prior to enrollment; 2.) require special admissions consideration; and 3.) qualify as economically disadvantaged according to the guidelines indicated (see below). In selecting students for the program, priority is given to applicants from historically disadvantaged backgrounds.

Financial Eligibility

The table below lists financial guidelines for Educational Opportunity Program eligibility during the 2011-12 academic year. In order to be determined economically disadvantaged, a student's household income must not exceed the amount shown for its size in the applicable category or the student's circumstances must conform to one of the exceptions indicated. **NOTE: Eligibility guidelines are anticipated to change for the 2012-13 academic year. Fee Waiver

Students submitting applications for EOP consideration may qualify for application fee waivers for up to four campus choices. If the applicant does not meet both academic and

economic eligibility guidelines or if the campus does not operate an Educational Opportunity Program, the student will be billed for the fee. **NOTE: Applicants who are deemed ineligible for EOP may still qualify for admission and financial aid through other admissions processes.**

Support Services

Educational Opportunity Program students may receive support services, such as academic, career and personal counseling, tutoring and supplemental instruction. As part of a student's overall financial aid package, the Educational Opportunity Program provides financial assistance for non-tuition related expenses (e.g., books, supplies, etc.).

Campus Participation

The following SUNY campuses do not operate an Educational Opportunity Program: Adirondack, Cayuga County, Clinton, Columbia-Greene, Corning, Herkimer County, Jamestown, Jefferson, Mohawk Valley, Nassau, Niagara County, North Country, Orange County, Rockland, Sullivan County and Tompkins Cortland Community Colleges.

Transfer Option

To be eligible for the program as a transfer, a student must have been enrolled in the Educational Opportunity Program, College Discovery, HEOP (Higher Education Opportunity Program), SEEK (Search for Education, Elevation and Knowledge) or a similar program at his/her previous college. If the previous college did not have EOP or a similar program, the student may receive consideration for transfer eligibility and should notify the college to which he/she is transferring.
